

Rotorua's Civic Memorial Service is in memory of those who have served and died for our country during World War One and the wars that have followed. It is an opportunity to acknowledge the lifestyle and freedom we are able to enjoy today as a result of the sacrifices made by our service men and women in various parts of the world.

This is an invitation for representatives from your school to attend this year's Civic Memorial Service. The service will be held at the Sir Howard Morrison Centre, 1170 Fenton Street, and will commence at 9.30am on Tuesday 25 April 2023. Those who wish to take part in the Parade beforehand are asked to assemble at 9.10am at the Te Arawa Soldiers' Memorial, intersection of Oruawhata and Queen's Drive, Government Gardens. The march will travel along Queen's Drive past the Cenotaph, through Prince's Arch to Arawa Street and finish at the Sir Howard Morrison Centre..

There will be an opportunity for school representatives to lay a wreath during the Civic Service.
